Functional Fall: Put a Lid on It

We the People: Photographs by Nina Berman

Sep 8-Nov 24; The Capa Space

Take a journey through more than three decades of work by the two-time World Press Photo Award-winner and New York Foundation for the Arts grant recipient, Nina Berman. In this exhibition, the Capa Space presents a moving depiction of Berman's illumination of American social movements and protest through her documentation of public outrages and injustices. The Capa Space additionally invited community
